







What is an Essay?

An Essay
is an organized collection
of your ideas
nicely written,
and professionally presented.

In other words, the essay must be well structured (i.e. organized) and presented in a way that the reader finds easy to follow and clear: it must look tidy and not present any obstacles to the reader. It must have a clear readable interesting style. But, above all, it must consist of your ideas about the topic. This is the centre of it: this, and this only, gets the marks.

1 RELEVANCE TO THE TOPIC

Communicates to the reader how well you have understood the topic.



STRUCTURE AND ORGANIZATION -

Communicates to the reader how organized you are in your thinking.

PARAGRAPHS are the only instruments you have to communicate this structure in your thinking.

Hence use the paragraphs to neatly and logically arrange your ideas on the Topic

VALUATION CRITERIA

BACKGROUND READING - KNOWLEDGE - In the business of the media

- 5. STYLE CREATIVITY these are the most difficult things to explain.
- But, style is "what is distinguished and distinguishing."
- It's the way one writer says something that is different from the way another writer would say it, but it doesn't mean, necessarily, flashy or fancy writing.
- Essay writing works best when it is kept simple.

EVALUATION CRITERIA

SPELLING AND GRAMMAR-

Minor grammatical and spelling errors are generally ignored. But severe and persistent errors will work against you.

A spelling error may not be taken very seriously.

However, there is a tendency to think among all of us that a person making a spelling error is, somehow, stupid.

PRESENTATION

Simply means your essay has to be legible and neat. A sloppy presentation can irritate the reader.

ALWAYS PUT THE READER FIRST.

The Five Paragraph Essay



We will now learn how to write an essay in a structured manner.

You do not have to be a wizard to learn to write excellent five-paragraph essays. You do need some basic skill and practice.

Though there are several types of essays, this format that we are going to learn will help you to develop the specific thinking and organizational patterns that will aid in the timed creation of an essay.





The Essay

What is it?

The five paragraph essay follows a defined format.

The <u>first paragraph</u> introduces us to the thesis of the essay and directs us to the three main supporting subtopics.

The <u>second through fourth paragraphs</u> are all similar in format. They individually restate the subtopics, and are developed by giving supporting information.

The <u>fifth and last paragraph</u> restates the main thesis idea and reminds the reader of the three main supporting ideas that were developed.

This is the structure of a five paragraph essay. All of the five paragraphs are important.



The Essay

-Transition words

It is important to know that each of the paragraphs is joined together by a transition word, phrase or sentence. Transitions help the reader to follow the flow of the logic and sequencing. All of the essay types follow this basic transition format.

Tips:

Avoid the use of 'I' or 'you'.

Do not use contractions (e.g. don't, PLC etc..) in formal writing.

Organization is one of the most important parts of good writing. Make sure to organize from the first paragraph on.

And ABOVE ALL....

RE READ your essay to find and rectify any errors that are there.

DO NOT WORRY, the evaluator will always treat your test essay as a first draft - and condone minor imperfections. But it is important for you to present your best to the evaluator.



Tips:

Use as many transition words/phrases as possible.

Transitions glue our ideas and our essays together giving it the much needed logical "flow". Transition words or phrases are generally simple words or phrases to help the reader move smoothly form one idea to another – one sentence to the next, or from one paragraph to the next.

Examples of **transition** words are:

THEN, he moved on to the next slide.

AS A RESULT, the team lost the game.

FOR THIS REASON, she always went home early.

NEVERTHELESS, something still appears to be missing. Etc.... To name a few.

We will look at **transitions** a little more closely and understand their significance in an essay



Consider the following three sentence example:

- 1. The entire building had to be searched.
- 2. They started the search on the third floor.
- 3. It took three hours to complete the search.

Notice that the three separate statements are all valid sentences. They convey the bare essential facts of the situation, but nothing more. In fact, they raise almost more questions than they answer.

Let's transform these now, using transition phrases:

UNLIKE the previous minor incident, this time the entire building had to be searched. BECAUSE the fire was still smoking on the first two floors, they had to start on the third, working upwards to the tenth, covering the first two floors last. CONSEQUENTLY, it took them a full three hours before they finally completed the typical typical typical job.

Listening is a dying art. We hardly listen to understand. We only listen to refute or reply



Stephen R. Covey, in his book, "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People: Powerful Lessons in Personal Change," makes the observation that most people do not listen with the intent to understand; they listen with the intent to reply. One cannot agree more with this observation. More so, in the current culture rooted in the pursuit of self-interest giving rise to intolerance between individuals and groups, and even terrorism in the world!

From youngsters who decry that they are not understood by the older generation to races that complain of being persecuted by others, there is a complete breakdown of communication – because communication involves speaking and listening! Ironically, the world does not lack ideas of peace and co-existence. The people who profess them call the others intolerant; the so-called fanatics are unable to get their points of view across. Communication breaks down, as every one appears to be trying to prove the other wrong! We do "hear" the other point of view, but simply do not "listen!" The art of listening is probably dead. The whole idea is not to understand the other, in which there is peace and compassion and co-existence, but to refute and be the intellectual winner.



Communication can free us from suppression and thus from frustration, aggression and violence. Children do not listen to their parents; parents do not listen to their children – it is a relationship based on psychological violence, both ways. The husband does not listen the wife, not does the wife listen to her husband – it then becomes a relationship based on dependence and attachment. Both occasionally allayed by affection. This lack of communication extends to international relations too, and is driven by pursuit of pure self-interest.

The remedy lies in learning to "listen" with an attentiveness that annihilates the self and creates space for empathy and affection to exist. Listening may then be the most powerful tool to bring about a radical change in oneself and in mankind as a whole. (300 words)
